- Perform a dry run to create a procedure checklist.




### Meeting Procedures



- Meeting scripts can be adjusted to include new procedures

- Literature BYOB!
- Newcomers
- Anniversaries
- Finances
- Accessibility

### Meeting Delivery Format

- Will your group continue to have an online meeting or hybrid?
- If you decide to continue with an online meeting check if it conflicts with other group times or find a gap where an online meeting would serve best.
- Update your meeting info with Intergroup, District and Area.





### 7<sup>th</sup> Tradition

- Consider having one group member carry the physical basket
- Provide gloves to collector/treasurer
- Explore digital options

## PPE (Personal Protective Equipment)

- Consult local requirements.
- If someone chooses not to comply or is unable to comply with requirements perhaps have online options prepared in advance, group member phone numbers, etc.
- Meetings could provide masks for free or for sale.
- Make hand sanitizer available to attendees (non alcoholic most likely will not comply with local standards)
- Gloves for group members handling 7<sup>th</sup>, meeting materials, etc.





### Social Distancing

- Seating is arranged 2 meters apart
- Greeters: no handshakes or hugs
- Consider fellowship before and after the meeting outside of the meeting venue





#### CONSIDER NEW OR REVISED SERVICE POSITIONS

- Spiritual Sanitizer
- Revised greeter duties
- Designated 7<sup>th</sup> Tradition basket collector
- Technology committee (rotating, of course!)

#### **OUR TRADITIONS**

- Above all, each group is asked to consider the AA Principles as the guiding force to a group conscience &, in particular, to pay close attention to the following Traditions:
- <u>Tradition 1</u> Our common welfare should come first; personal recovery depends upon A.A. unity.
- <u>Tradition 4</u> Each group should be autonomous except in matters affecting other groups, or A.A. as a whole.
- <u>Tradition 5</u> Each group has but one primary purpose to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers.
- <u>Tradition 7</u> Every A.A. group ought to be fully self-supporting, declining outside contributions.
- <u>Tradition 10</u> Alcoholics Anonymous has no opinion on outside issues, hence the A.A. name ought never be drawn into public controversy.
- <u>Tradition 11</u> Our public relations policy is based upon attraction rather than promotion; we need always maintain personal anonymity at the level of press, radio & films.
- <u>Tradition 12</u> Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all our Traditions, ever reminding us to place principles before personalities.
